### Anniversaries & Celebrations

2024 marks the **fifth anniversary** of Crows' Feat Farm, and it's hard to believe how fast the time has flown! When we embarked on the journey of bringing food and friendship to the community, we anticipated that it would take *at least* ten years to figure out what we were doing. That sounds about right – we are now only half as stupid as we were when we started! After all, the one yield that farming reliably supplies is humility.

Given this region's short seasons, each year we get one crack at remedying past years' mistakes and (hopefully) learning something new that's useful. Against a backdrop of naturally variable growing conditions – not to speak of market dynamics and people challenges – we are always on our toes.

Our commitment to permaculture methods exposes us to more than the usual uncertainty, because we don't try to control everything through the use of chemicals (fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides) or energy-intensive growing methods. We try as best we can to rely on low-intervention strategies that work alongside the wisdom nature offers. It's fascinating, because along with every year's crushing disappointments...

*Usually there are at least a dozen such events, which this year included the loss of many chicks and hens, the devastation of the squash vine borer, premature bolting of broccoli and lettuce, and out-of-control rabbits (just to name a few)*

...come many unexpected blessings.

*These included the self-seeding of our gorgeous amaranth and arugula when the originals failed or bolted; the abeyance of last year's pests (the Colorado potato beetle and tomato horn worm); an abundance of honey; and the arrival of tree frogs, killdeer (aka land pipers) and hundreds of monarch butterflies to dance with us. Not to mention the overwhelming support and enthusiasm of our volunteers, farm share participants and market customers*

So, on this our fifth anniversary, we stand humbled, as we sit in awe and gratitude to nature and our community.

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## *In Honor of Devin Torres*

In July we also celebrated Devin Torres's one-year anniversary with Crows' Feat Farm. Devin joined us last year to assist with our summer concerts and picnics. We thought it would be a limited engagement, but he has proven himself to be indispensable to the mission of Crows' Feat Farm. Despite a lengthy commute amid crazy drivers, Devin has missed only one day of work over the past year. He has come early and stayed late. He has accepted any task we asked of him, and done it well. He now understands all the seasons of a farm, and we are delighted that Devin will become a founding member and equity participant of our cooperative.
